Parish Council Annual Report

The Parish Council year commenced with the commissioning of our new Parish Council and Councillors at a special Mass at Our Lady of Grace.

The 2019-2020 year has provided the Council with many topics of great importance to work through.

The implementation of synod outcomes were put on hold as the Council focussed on the directive from the Cardinal to undertake a review of churches and presbyteries, their locations as well as mass counts and demographics.

The Parish Council carried out research on demographics and ministries. Parishioners were widely consulted with the Council holding four face to face meetings at SFX and four at Our Lady of Grace sites. On line consultation surveys were also available and well used by parishioners as a means of ensuring all viewpoints were taken into account. The finance committee researched information about our buildings. The data collection phase was completed and was available for parishioner's consideration at a meeting held in the Pettit Centre. The results of the review with developed proposals were submitted to the Cardinal by 30th October 2019. An eight page summary was released for parish members with a full copy of the report available on request. At time of writing this annual report we are awaiting clarification on a response from the Cardinal's Office.

COIVD-19 saw the parish in lock down and parishioners using technology to access masses throughout NZ and the world. The Parish Council set up a well being phone tree and contacted a number of parishioners. Thank you to those who assisted with this. The council was busy forward thinking in preparation for changes in levels set by government regulations. Parishioners' co-operation and assistance in making the procedures we implemented work has been very much appreciated. A big 'Thank you' to you all. Thanks to Father Tony for circulating daily reflections and helping us all through this challenging time. A meeting for Parish Council chairs for the archdiocese saw a number of valuable learnings for parishes from lock down. One of the many learning was the necessity of having up to date technology equipment and facilities in parishes.

Our post COVID gathering, as a parish, was a celebration of Mass by Cardinal John on the 9th August at Our Lady of Grace, followed by morning tea at St Brendan's School hall. It was a wonderful way to be together again as a parish in fellowship and worship.

Parish Council members attended the second Safe Guarding workshop. Ensuring that Our Lady of the Valleys Parish has relevant documentation and a full understanding of safeguarding practices for the protection of children and vulnerable adults is essential. Policies and procedures are in place for the parish. The Cardinal has established a National Office of Professional Standards, A complaints Officer position and a Safeguarding Advisers role based at the Catholic Centre. The training advised that using The Ministry for Children (Oranga Tamariki) or Police are also options for referrals as are the facilities at the Catholic Centre. The Parish Council continues to work with advisers to ensure all policies and procedures remain current at Our Lady of the Valleys and that parishioners understand that Safeguarding applies to us all, volunteers as well as to employees and priests.

The Council has continued to work with the Finance Committee, Liturgy Committee and St Brendan's School to keep general communication open and an awareness of what was going on in the parish. The Council supports the work of the Youth Group that is based at St Francis Xavier and acknowledges and thanks them for their contribution to the parish.

The annual parish picnic was very attended with parishioners enjoying the summer sun, sharing a picnic, BBQ and Samoan food while mixing and mingling. A great time was had by all.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Father Tony for his guidance, my Deputy Chair John O'Malley, Conor Healy, Minute Secretary and all other members of the council for their work on the many challenging issues we have faced over the past year. Thank you to all.



Liturgy Committee Report

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

The Liturgy Committee meets every fourth Thursday of the month in St. Francis Xavier or Our Lady of Grace meeting rooms. Along with Father Tony Kearns, our Parish Priest, we plan for the special feast days and



The Catholic Centre provides a wide variety of courses and workshops to support our own spiritual knowledge and development. This year the workshops that we attended were facilitated by Father Patrick Bridgeman and Michael Mangin. The Catholic Centre also provides musical, visual and liturgical related resources which support us as we plan for the various Liturgical Celebrations.

The main Liturgical Events during the year are Easter, Pentecost and Christmas. The Liturgy Committee seeks the assistance from our fellow parishioners to take on the many roles and ministries within the parish. These include: Sacristans, Greeters, Leaders, Readers, Writers of Prayers of the Faithful, Children's Liturgy Leaders, Altar Servers, Extra-ordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, music groups and choirs, etc.

We are very aware of the special character of each of the two parish churches. There are times when we come together as one parish, in one location to celebrate special feast days such as: All Souls Day, All Saints, Assumption, or special Liturgical Celebrations such as: Good Friday, Holy Thursday, Easter and Christmas Reconciliations, First Reconciliation, Confirmation, First Holy Communion, and Parish, Children/Family Masses. Family Masses or Parish Masses have taken place on Sunday morning at Our Lady of Grace Church. These Masses have been held each school term and parents or grandparents have been encouraged to support their child/children to undertake the various Sunday Ministries. Parishioners were invited to stay for morning tea after Mass and Conor Healy and Prue von Keisenberg have organised a team to set up sporting activities on the grass alongside the church.

During the planning process, for the various Liturgical Celebrations, every attempt is made to allocate these in an equitable manner between the two churches. The Liturgy Committee plans the Sunday Masses, and we also provide opportunities for training the various parish ministries in their roles. At times this has involved inviting experts to present workshops, or fellow parishioners, who have experience and expertise to present the required training in the targeted areas where further training is required, and as new people take on new ministries.

During the year, Pat Hoult and John O'Malley led Parish workshops for Proclaimers of the Word, and Liturgy of the Word with Communion (visiting the sick), and Liturgy of the Word when Father is not present. Conor Healy continues to train the Altar Servers. Our Lady of the Valleys Liturgy Committee invited Ministers from St. Joseph's in Upper Hutt to also attend these workshops. All attendees found these workshops very informative and they provided opportunities for discussion.



Our Lady of the Valleys Liturgy Committee is a very small group of committed parishioners, who would like to take this opportunity to thank our fellow parishioners for their generous support that we receive from those who share their talents, time and treasures for our Liturgical Celebrations. During the course of the year the following people have left the Committee, Tony Condor, Debbie Morgan, Jennifer Rodricks and Maciej Szczesny for a variety of reasons.

Before leaving, Tony Condor, completed an in depth revue of all the parish properties, and for this we are very grateful.

On behalf of the parish, I wish to thank them for their contributions to the Finance Committee and the Parish.

The most notable event for the Finance Committee this year was that the mortgage for the refurbishment of the presbytery and the strengthening of the Heretaunga church was paid off, a number of years earlier than required.

The Committee continues to oversee the maintenance of the two church properties and also the hall at Stokes Valley that is licensed to the Koraunui Marae.

We, the Committee, continue to encourage parishioners to use Automatic Payment or Direct Credit options for providing funding of the Parish, thus reducing the amount of money held on the premises and streamlining the administration process of recording parishioners giving.

During the last financial year, because of the revenue of all of the parishes in the Archdiocese and the hold put on all but essential maintenance, there are some maintenance matters that will need to be addressed in the near future with some urgency.

Filipino Community

(Community for the Holy Family)



As a group of migrant families, the Community for the Holy Family provides a unique ministry of music and presence in the Our Lady of the Valleys Parish, especially in the Our Lady of Grace church in Heretaunga, Upper Hutt. At the Mass of fourth Sunday of the month, the choice of songs is a combination of New Zealand, Filipino and commonly played liturgical songs. In a simple way, the ability to exercise this ministry demonstrates the invitation, participation and support for diverse groups to get engaged in the life of the Parish. In the Catholic churches in New Zealand, the presence of migrants from many parts of the world is increasingly being observed, and will continue to be so. It is very encouraging to see migrants and migrant faith groups, like the Community for the Holy Family provided with opportunities to be actively involved in various ministries including community leadership. Such involvement extends beyond the parish. For the Community, some of its members continue to be actively involved in the works of the Commission for Ecology, Justice and Peace, and the Filipino Chaplaincy Pastoral Council in the Archdiocese of Wellington.

The families that make up the Community for the Holy Family continue to come together for communal prayers and choir practices. The Community uses the Pettit Centre for these gatherings on Saturdays before the fourth Sunday, from 4:30-7:30pm. However from March 2020, these regular activities were disrupted by the security lockdown brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic. During this time, the Community continued to be connected with one another and with the Parish through the Parish's emails, notices and inspiring and prayerful reflections especially during the Holy Week and Easter celebrations. Like everyone else we were constantly on the lookout of when would the parishioners be allowed back to physically come and worship together in the church. Now that lockdown had been eased, the Community is able to plan initial steps to resume the ministry. Embracing some sense of normality being able to come, pray and sing together, there is a deep awareness however that the pandemic significantly changed the society, the Parish, and the Community. We are aware that the rest of the world continues to suffer from COVID-19. In many places, people are still restricted on their movements and the challenges they bring including inability to provide to their families' basic needs like food or access to contactless education for their children, and continuing threat of being We remember and pray deeply for families and friends contaminated by the virus. especially those known to us who have lost loved ones to COVID-19.

The Community of the Holy Family will continue to provide music for the 4th Sunday Mass at the Our Lady of Grace church, and will support programmes that encourage active involvement of the migrants and the poor in the parish life. Through some of its members, the Community can assist in building stronger relationship between the Parish and the Commission for Ecology, Justice and Peace, and the Filipino Chaplaincy in their efforts to

respond to the impact of the pandemic on the vulnerable families in our communities, including migrant temporary working visa holders. The Community also welcomes anyone who may be interested to join its regular prayers, music ministry and service for those in need.

Samoan Community

Our Lady of the Valleys Parish is fortunate in that we have not one but two Samoan communities operating within the Parish, one based in Stokes Valley and the other in Heretaunga. These groups provide a rich and supportive cultural environment for the Samoan families in the Parish and share their cultural gifts and talents with the wider Parish family.



Stokes Valley Samoan Community

The Samoan Community in Stokes Valley (known as the Aulotu), have two main groups that branch from this main community – the Samoan Aufaipese (Choir) and Samoan Autalavou (Youth). Our community is funny in the sense that the people who are in the Choir are also in the Youth and vice versa so although we are doing a certain activity as a choir (for example), you are most likely to encounter the same people if we were doing an activity as the youth

Choir practice has been held every Wednesday 7:00pm and Saturday 2:00pm to prepare for the Sunday mass. With the Parish youth group OVERFLOW singing on the 3rd Sunday of every month, (which started earlier 2020) the choir sings on the 1st, 2nd, 4th and 5th Sundays at SFX.

With COVID-19 music was on hold for a while until we went down to level 2. The organist designated for that particular Sunday would put together a song selection and the choir would just sing on the Sunday with no choir practice to reduce contract tracing. As we have gone into level 1 choir practice will only be held if the organist has any new repertoire to introduce to the choir.

The Samoan youth work hand in hand with OVERFLOW with providing morning tea after 8:30am Sunday Mass. Morning tea is usually a spread of finger food made and provided by families within the aulotu and members of OVERFLOW. This has been a great way to fellowship with people within the Parish who attends Sunday mass and are willing to stay behind and chat and have something to eat and drink.

The aulotu continue to maintain the grounds around the church at Stokes Valley. The community gather every fortnight rain or shine in the early hours of Saturday mornings. Work includes a range of jobs – mowing/raking the grass, pruning trees, water blasting. Any lawn waste or general rubbish from the job is also taken care of by the community. If there is a family that is on the roster to clean the church, we all gather as a community to help out and we clean.

Finally, every fourth Sunday of the month at 11:30am, we celebrate mass in the Samoan language as we are a part of the Wellington Samoan Chaplaincy. It is a very important privilege and honour to have the opportunity to celebrate mass in our native tongue and it is an integral part to our activities as an aulotu.

St Brendan's School

We are very familiar with the whakatauki, 'he waka eke noa'. Pope Francis used this during the Urbi and Orbi blessing on the steps of St Peter's Basilica in March while New Zealand was in lockdown. "We have realized that we are on the same boat, all of us fragile ... but at the same time important and needed, all of us called to row together ... only together can we do this". We were called to row together, through the calm, the storms and the uncertainty. Our Lady of the Valleys Parish is blessed to have two St Vincent de Paul Conferences working in the Parish, one centred in Heretaunga and the other in Stokes Valleys.

Each in their own way strive to follow the ideals of the Society to provide

support for the less fortunate members of our Parish family and also the wider civic community.

St Vincent de Paul Society – Heretaunga

Members of our conference continue to put their time and energies into a variety of activities. These consist of visitations (both public and private homes) - 76hrs; transport -40hrs; attending funerals - 34 hours; food parcels and other - 18 hours while 90 hours were spent at the St Vinnies' shop, in Stokes Valley.

We have maintained our links with the St John's Anglican food bank; providing nonperishable goods kindly donated by parishioners. We also receive very generous baskets of goods from St Brendan's School. Cartons of gifts were also donated for Xmas parcels. We distributed grocery and warehouse vouchers amounting to over \$3,000.

Our conference continues to respond to requests for financial assistance from families or individuals in need. An example was an Iraqi family who needed furniture and other household items. A lounge suite and kitchen stools were obtained from the Petone shop while the Conference purchased household goods as well as a motor mower for them; the total amounting to over \$900.

This year, we gained one new member. Vaughan was welcomed (along with three new members into the Stokes Valley conference) in an initiation ceremony followed by a blessing of all members from Fr Tony.

Our conference is very grateful to the Stokes Valley conference for their continued financial support.

I would like to give my personal thanks to my committee members - Brenda Lister (Secretary) Kevin von Keisenberg (Treasurer), Marion Conroy, Leola Kelly, Josette Gibbs, Ben Perera and Vaughan Lloyd-Jones for their valued support.
