General Business



Parish Council Annual Report



Dear Parishioners

The current Parish Pastoral Council members are Darrell Mellow (Chairperson), Doug Fauchelle (Deputy Chair), Fr Maleko Api-Tufuga (PP), Roy Scoon (Minutes), Ahmed Hemady, Erin Murphy, Prue von Keisenberg, Philip Calvert, AnnMarie Bailey and Lita van Bunnik, and the St Brendan's School Rep being either the Principal or the DRS and one member from the finance committee.

The Parish Pastoral Council year commenced with the commissioning of our new Parish Pastoral Council on the 11th of August at St Francis Xavier Church at the 8.30am mass.

In February we farewelled Fr Tony Kearns from our Parish and welcomed Fr Maleko Api-Tufuga and were very fortunate to have Archbishop Paul officiate in Fr Maleko's installation mass into our parish. A very moving ceremony that I had not been witness to before.

As in the past few years, the Parish Pastoral Council continued to monitor Covid 19 in our communities and our decision to only offer communion of one kind. At our July Parish Pastoral Council meeting, at the request of a parishioner, after some robust discussions, it was decided that we would let parishioners have their say on the bringing back of communion of both kinds by having clipboards available in both churches where parishioners could make their choices know. This was to run from 27th July to the 3rd August and results will be analysed by the parish pastoral council at our August meeting and advised to the parish after that has happened.

This year, the parish pastoral council finished updating the Parish Plan that will help guide our parish over the next ten years. I would like to thank those members of the Parish Pastoral Council that took on this task to get this completed and in use and referred to during our meetings. It needs to be reminded that the Parish Plan belongs to the whole Parish, not just the current parish pastoral council and is a living document that will be maintained as and when the needs of the parish change.

The Living Stones committee continue in their task of working through where we as a parish would like to see the parish in the future and I thank them all for their dedication to this task.

The Parish council has been very lucky to have been able to hold a few council meetings at St Brendan's, the last being in July, I must admit, the staffroom is a lot warmer than our usual meeting rooms and Veronica has been a very welcoming host.

I was fortunate to have been invited as Parish Pastoral Chair to the reopening of our Cathedral earlier in the year. It was a very moving occasion and one that I was privileged to attend and will not forget.

I now come to the end of my time on the parish pastoral council having served four years plus an extension of two more years. I have enjoyed my time on the council and have worked alongside some fantastic people and have also met a lot of people in our parish and further afield in our Catholic diocese.

I would like to thank firstly Fr Tony for his guidance and wisdom when I first started on the council and to Fr Maleko, as you juggled getting to know our parish and how we do things here while still fulfilling our parish faith needs. My Deputy Chair Doug Fauchelle, Minutes Secretary Roy Scoon and the rest of the Parish Council for their dedication, commitment, and the diversity each has brought to our Parish over the last twelve months. I thank you all for your dedication to our Parish.

Liturgy Committee Report

Dear Fellow Parishioners,
Our Lady of the Valleys Members:

The Liturgy Committee meets every fourth Thursday of the month in St. Francis Xavier or Our Lady of Grace Meeting Rooms, along with Father Tony Kearns and later Father Maleko, our Parish Priests during this past year. Together, we plan for the special feast days and celebrations that are an integral part of the calendar year of the Catholic Church in New Zealand.

During this past year, Our Lady of the Valleys Parish, has seen an increase in parishioner attendance at Sunday Masses and our major celebrations, which are held throughout the year.

The main Liturgical Events during the year are Easter, Pentecost and Christmas. During Holy Week, which started with the procession into the churches on Palm Sunday. On the Wednesday, the RCIA support Group collected the Holy Oils at the Chrism Mass. During the Holy Thursday ceremony, Father Maleko washed the feet of 12 parishioners and the Blessed Sacrament was placed at the Altar of Repose in the Petit Centre. At the Good Friday celebration, 2 men carried the heavy cross into the church and the wooden cross was pounded into position and then the Veneration of the Cross took place. At the Easter Vigil we experienced the lighting of the Easter fire and the blessing of the new Easter candle followed by the moving Easter Vigil Mass, which included the reception into the Church of our 2 RCIA candidates.

Pentecost is another major celebration in the Church's calendar year. During the Pentecost Sunday Masses, a group of parishioners translated and read the Prayers of the Faithful in their own language – French, Dutch, Samoan, Filipino, Japanese, Tongan, Akan (South African), Tagalong, Mandarin, Tokelauan, Rotuman, Hindi, Korean, Malayalam, Vietnamese, Iwabu (PNG), English and Te Reo Maori. The Liturgy Committee is grateful to these parishioners, the musicians and all the parishioners who helped us all to celebrate the Birthday of the Church.

On Sunday, 2nd February Our Lady of Grace Parish celebrated a Farewell and Thanksgiving Mass for Father Tony, who had been our Parish Priest for 9 years. This was Father's final Mass before he took up the position as Parish Priest in Upper Hutt.

Then on February 16th, the Parish celebrated at the Installation Mass of Father Maleko, as Parish Priest of Our Lady of the Valleys Parish. Archbishop Paul and Father Tony also concelebrated this Mass, as this Mass was also a celebration of our Parish 10th year Anniversary of the establishment of our Parish. This coincided with the Parish Picnic. This was a wonderful Parish celebration with a combined choir, and parishioners from across the parish fulfilling all the ministry roles at this 10am Mass.

The Sacramental Programme has progressed throughout the year, as planned. Archbishop Paul Martin visited our parish to Confirm 29 of our children on 15th June. This was a wonderful celebration for the families involved and the parish. We also gathered to celebrate the Sacraments of Reconciliation, and in September First Holy Communion, and to support these children on their continuing faith journey.

Our Lady of the Valleys Parish is very fortunate to have a wide variety of dedicated music groups, who lead and support the singing in our parish. Josephine Eynon is the conductor for the Music Group at Our Lady of Grace Church. Sauni Aukusitino Aukustino, is the leader for the Samoan Choir, and he leads the singing at the 8:30 am Sunday Mass at St. Francis Xavier Church. A Samoan Mass is held every 4th Sunday of the month at St. Francis Xavier Church. Stella Stowers plays the organ at both churches. Two other organists also play regularly at St. Francis Xavier Church. Joey Domdom, leads the Filipino music group and Robert Whiteford plays the organ at Our Lady of Grace Church. We are grateful to these committed groups and individuals, who so generously share their talents with us.

The Liturgy Committee seeks the assistance from our fellow parishioners to take on the many roles and ministries within the parish. These include Sacristans, Greeters, Leaders, Readers, Writers of Prayers of the Faithful, Children's Liturgy Leaders, Altar Servers, Extra-ordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, music groups and choirs, etc. The Liturgy Committee are forever grateful to these parishioners for sharing their time and talents. As a result of the "Time and Talent Survey," we are currently adding new names to the rosters to ensure that these are up to date and these will be maintained on an ongoing basis. This is a huge undertaking.

The Liturgy Committee looks forward in the future to organising future Family Masses and training sessions for the various ministries in the parish. During the year, training has taken place for: Proclaimers of the Word, new Extra-ordinary Ministers of Holy Communion and the Altar Servers. This will continue during this coming year.

Our Lady of the Valleys Liturgy Committee is a very small group of committed parishioners, who would like to take this opportunity to thank our fellow parishioners for their generous support that we receive from those who share their talents, time and treasures for our Liturgical Celebrations. We continue to manage the finances of the Parish and also the Property portfolio which involves the land and buildings that the Parish own, both at the Heretaunga site and Stokes Valley.

The Stokes Valley properties generate a good income for the Parish from the leases and Licences held by other organisations that operate from the site.

We also manage the ongoing repairs and maintenance for the two sites and the buildings on them.

One of the most expensive costs to the Parish is the ongoing insurance premiums, which we have to budget for out the income, and the premium has to be paid in full, when due.

The finances of the Parish are in good shape as can be seen from the returns attached to this report.

We continue to encourage our parishioners to instigate automatic payments of gifting to the Parish finances, as this removes the amount of cash that is retained and handled in the Parish office.



We have a number of regular dates we support, such as the last Wednesday of the month morning tea at a local cafe, we are on the Parish roster for the Sunday cafe after 10.30am Mass and our regular collection of toiletries has been very welcome by the Chaplain at Lower Hutt Hospital.

There have been several special occasions we've hosted this year, like our High Tea in February, with about 30 guests, including our friends from Upper Hutt and Lower Hutt who came to share this with us. Our March meeting coincided with Ash Wednesday so we attended 9.30am Mass in the church and invited the Parishioners to join us afterwards for a cup of tea and hot cross buns.

For our birthday in June a number of St Brendan's School students entertained us and our guests with singing and a couple of them played instruments. It was a delightful afternoon for all, with the children a credit to to both parents and teachers. We really appreciate our special connection with St Brendan's School, fostered by the Principal, Veronica Sawers, who is also a League member.

In July we invited Parishioners to join us for a soup and rolls lunch as a fundraiser for Nourish Trust, a local charity aiming to give hampers of food to families in need at Christmas.

As well as the ongoing donations of food and toiletries we have given \$300 to St Brendan's School for Veronica's emergency fund, \$200 to Tonga towards a new school roof, \$100 to WUCWO, \$200 towards the new stove in the Pettit Centre and \$300 to Nourish Trust.

Filipino Community

(Community for the Holy Family, the Filipino Chaplaincy: Barangay Our Lady of Miraculous Medal, and the Couples for Christ Community)



The Filipino community within Our Lady of the Valleys Parish continues to grow in both numbers and involvement. Their active participation in church and parish activities reflects a deepening commitment to spiritual life and community service. This engagement is primarily driven by three key groups: the Community for the Holy Family, the Barangay of Our Lady of Miraculous Medal, and the Couples for Christ.

The Community for the Holy Family plays an important role in the parish's liturgical life, particularly through regular involvement in the music ministry every fourth Sunday of the month. Beyond musical contributions, the group actively nurtures spiritual growth by holding Bible study and prayer sessions on the third and fourth Saturdays of each month at the Petit Centre. The group is also part of the parish's cleaning roster, contributing to the upkeep of the church environment. During Holy Week, the community further enriched parish life by organizing a Lenten retreat, offering parishioners a meaningful opportunity for reflection and spiritual renewal.

The Barangay of Our Lady of Miraculous Medal continues to offer pastoral care and support to Filipino parishioners through a dedicated Facebook page and chat group that help keep members informed and engaged. The Barangay enriches parish life through various annual events, including the Marian Month Celebration at Sts. Peter and Paul Church in Lower Hutt, the novena and Feast Day of Our Lady of Miraculous Medal, Family Day or Picnic, and Visita Iglesias during Holy Week. A distinctive aspect of the community's spiritual outreach is the Family Block Rosary, where the image of Our Lady of Miraculous Medal is hosted by different families every fortnight, fostering prayerful connection and strengthening both family and community bonds. Members actively serve in parish ministries such as mass readings, church cleaning, and altar serving—particularly involving younger members—and also assist with church decorations during Christmas and provide needed services during the Holy Week. Last December, a group of young carolers from the community raised funds to support various Archdiocesan initiatives. The Barangay offers pastoral care such as compassionate support to bereaved families through novena prayers and other forms of assistance. It also sponsors one of the monthly Filipino First Sunday Masses, and works in partnership with Barangay Santo Rosaryo in Upper Hutt to organize the Christmas novena masses, known as Simbang Gabi. Donations collected during these celebrations are generously given to the respective parishes, reflecting the community's deep commitment to faith, service, and solidarity.

The Couples for Christ (CFC) community continues to enrich parish life through parish church services such as scheduled morning teas and church cleaning. Behind the scenes, CFC conducts prayer assemblies and praise and worship sessions for families, supported by its various ministries. Notably, this year, the Youth for Christ (YFC)—the youth arm of CFC—provided music and entertainment during the Parish Anniversary celebration and picnic held in February.

Together, these Filipino community groups offer invaluable support to the parish, enhancing cultural engagement and spiritual vitality. With continued prayers for grace and guidance from the Holy Spirit, Our Lady of the Valleys Parish looks forward to an even more vibrant and united community that welcomes and gathers people into the life of the Church.

St Brendan's School

St Brendan was a brave explorer who set sail on an adventure to navigate the world. He was the Patron Saint of sailors, travellers, and navigation. We use these familiar references to reflect who we are as a school and the journey our students go through during their eight years at St Brendan's. We are the only school in Aotearoa named after St Brendan and the only school in New Zealand founded by the Missionary Sisters of the Society of Mary (SMSM), we proudly uphold our unique heritage.

Our vision: Inspiring Navigators

Our values: God's irresistible GRACE: Gospel - Respect - Aspire - Compassion -

Our current strategic goals: Collaboration - Curriculum - Character

Our guiding whakatauki: He waka eke noa - we work in unity, we rise, fall and

Each of our **Houses**—Tralee, Clonard, Galway, and Annagh—connects us with places of significance to St Brendan's life in Ireland. Their mottos remind us to treasure life as a gift, grow with knowledge, aspire to make a difference, and reflect on today to set goals for tomorrow.

Our School Plan

We continue to focus on three key goals: Collaboration, Curriculum, and Character. We aim to strengthen community engagement, deliver an engaging curriculum that fosters student agency, and grow student identity as they walk with Christ. Initiatives include understanding and responding to diverse cultural values, implementing new English and Math curricula, embedding practices to promote well-being, and enriching students' faith journeys. Our school's values of God's Irresistible GRACE – Gospel, Respect, Aspire, Compassion, Explore – are woven into all aspects of our plan and guide our actions, along with our guiding whakatauki, "He Waka Eke Noa - We work in unity, we rise, fall and keep going together." We are committed to working together to create a supportive and enriching environment where every student can thrive.

Highlights from the 2024 Catholic Special Character Review Report

The Catholic Special Character Review Report highlighted the strengths of our school's spiritual life and our community's commitment to living out our Catholic values.

The report commends St Brendan's for its rich spiritual life, which is deeply rooted in our vision of 'Inspiring Navigators' and our GRACE values. This is reflected in daily class prayer, weekly whole school and staff prayer, and retreat opportunities for students and staff. Our commitment to celebrating key moments in the life of the Church through liturgies and Masses, along with our regular participation in weekday Mass, further enhances our spiritual foundation. The school's support of the Parish Sacramental programmes and the Baptismal programme underscores our role in welcoming and evangelising within our community.

The report also recognises the successful implementation of the new national Religious Education curriculum across the school. The positive relationships between kaiako and ākonga create a welcoming environment in our classrooms, where students feel accepted and included for who they are. Through various leadership roles and initiatives, our tamariki are actively learning to live out their values and the principles of Catholic social teaching in their daily lives.

The report praises the strong unity between the staff and the Board in upholding our school's Catholic character. This commitment ensures that the Catholic character will continue to be safeguarded and strengthened in all decisions made for St Brendan's School.

Our Gift to the Community: Pātaka Kai for Our Lady of Grace In Term 4, 2024 a group of Adventurer students built a Pātaka Kai, a community food bank. This was designed and painted with the help of Amy Burrell. The project was blessed and gifted to Our Lady of the Valleys Parish to sit outside Our Lady of Grace Church, facing Fergusson Drive. We hope it will be a lasting and helpful resource for our community.

Celebrating Catholic Schools Day, Wednesday, 28 May, 2025

The day was an opportunity to come together to celebrate. The theme for this year: "Shine like stars in the world: E tīaho ana koe hei rama i te ao." This theme aligns with Pope Francis' designation of 2025 as the Church's Year of Jubilee, "Pilgrims of Hope". This Jubilee year encourages global sisterhood and brotherhood, solidarity with the poor, and care for the environment. Pope Francis encouraged us to strengthen our hope and to live as Jesus taught. He wanted our Catholic schools to be places of hope and light for everyone.

We had a very successful Catholic Schools Day with St Joseph's School, Upper Hutt. Some St Patrick's College students also joined us for the day. Our students enjoyed liturgy, celebrated Mass, created art, and had fun at Maidstone Max. It was great seeing our students show the theme, reflecting who we are as a Catholic school community, living as people of hope and caring for others.

Property Refurbishments

We are blessed to now have two modern, adaptable Year 7-8 learning spaces, joined by a sliding door that enables collaboration and teamwork, and a bright and welcoming junior classroom, each with its own breakout space. We also have a dedicated teacher workroom and storage and an incredible new STEAM facility complete with benches, ovens, microwaves, stove tops, and storage. Over time, we will continue to furnish and resource this space, making it an even greater asset to our school.

Rooms 8, 9, 12, and the library have also received major makeovers. To achieve this, these spaces were also packed up, relocated, and then reopened. Everyone was inconvenienced, but everyone was willing to spin on a dime and be creative with solutions. Despite what at times was significant disruption, we were able to hold all the events that we usually would during Terms 1 and 2.

This project's success was a collective effort, made possible by the support and expertise of many individuals and organisations. We extend our gratitude to the Archdiocese of Wellington; Archbishop Paul Martin our Proprietor; Koa Martel our School's Property Manager; the Upper Hutt City Council, and Mayor Wayne Guppy. Stokes Valley Samoan Community

The Samoan Community here in Stokes Valley (known as the Aulotu), have two main groups that branch from this main community – the Samoan Aufaipese (Choir) and Samoan Autalavou (Youth).

As it is the Jubilee Year of Hope, members of the Samoan Autalavou thought it would be good to resume the Morning Tea after the 8.30am mass just outside the church entrance. It's been such a blessing to see members of the community to fellowship together and finally put names to faces that we see each Sunday and even a chance to meet new parishioners or visitors that Sunday. We are blessed with the contributions, varying from packets of biscuits to money to purchase milk for the tea/coffee, from fellow parishioners and would like to thank you all once again. If you are keen to help with the Morning Tea setup (easy setup - we promise), just talk to anyone near the table and they will be able to sort something out! Certain members also prepared a small gift for our mothers on Mother's Day this year. It was later reported that not all the mother's present received a gift as their children were enthusiastic about the gifts too and got to them first!!

As an Aulotu, we participated in the 24 Hours for the Lord adoration that was held at the Sacred Heart Cathedral on Friday the 28th of March as part of the Archdiocese Jubilee celebrations. Our Parish had the 2am-3am slot so our Aulotu attended, leading with the rosary and hymns for the hour. Although it was quite early in the morning, it was an hour filled with the Holy Spirit and reflective prayer.

We continue to maintain the grounds around the St Francis Xavier church in Stokes Valley. Our work includes a range of jobs – mowing the grass, pruning trees and even water-blasting. We also contributed to the decoration of the church from Palm

Sunday through to the Easter services. We also church clean whenever one of the families in the Aulotu is rostered to church clean.

This year has been interesting as the celebrant of the Samoan mass is now our Parish priest, but we have been able to navigate new territory together and are still celebrating Samoan mass every fourth Sunday of the month at 11.30am. We welcome all to celebrate mass together with us in the Samoan language. God Bless,
